Christmas is a special day in the Inpatient Unit at Mary Potter Hospice.

While many patients try to get home for Christmas Day, it isn't always possible. So the staff and volunteers at the Hospice do whatever they can to make it a very special day.

Lunch is a traditional turkey roast with all the trimmings, and there is a vegetarian option of camembert and asparagus quiche. Cook Rob Barnet has worked a number of Christmas Days at the Hospice, and has been serving tasty meals for patients and visitors for about eight years.

"We always prepare enough food for the staff, volunteers and visitors too, so everyone can get a special Christmas meal," says Rob. "There will be lots of mince pies and Christmas pudding too, with custard and cream. Most people feel like a bit of a snooze after lunch." Jon Rouse, the Hospitality Manager said the table will be set for lunch. "While patients are usually served in their rooms, on Christmas Day we try to get as many people around the table to enjoy the meal together."

"The drinks trolley might do an extra round as well – although not for the staff of course," he laughed.

Jon will be wearing his usual elf outfit, specially purchased for his six-foot plus frame!

Nurse Sandy has been working at Mary Potter Hospice for six years. She's looking forward to doing her bit with the rest of the clinical team to keep patients as comfortable and happy as possible on this special day.

"There's always lots of extra treats that people bring in, which is appreciated. We are a great team. Even though we still have our usual work to do in the Inpatient Unit, we'll make sure it's a special day for everyone."

Work on the apartment complex next to the Hospice on Mein Street, Newtown, has begun.

The first stage of the project is a major renovation of three houses the Hospice owns on Mein Street. Then, in around February or March next year, the digging for the foundations for the apartment building starts.

A short whakawatea to bless the construction work has been held. Thanks to Kura and Alicia Moeahu who helped with the blessing and Spiritual Carer Chris Hartley who prayed for the project.

The apartments will not be sold, but will provide ongoing income for the Hospice on the open rental market.

Laughter at the hospice

If there's laughter in the Inpatient Unit and it's a Thursday, it's likely to be coming from an encounter with Tony de Joux.

Tony has been volunteering at the hospice for 12 years and every Thursday he plates up lunch for the patients. He's also in charge of the drinks trolley that goes around an hour before lunch.

Tony says that Mary Potter Hospice is a nice place to volunteer. "I like what I do there. I like talking to the patients. I get on well with the chaplains. You might say it's a calling."

Tony says he sometimes goes and talks to the patients before lunch to ask them if they are hungry. "I tell them, you don't have to eat it all, but you will still get your pudding. It gets a bit of a laugh from the kids and the family."

"You can't work there as a palliative care person in any shape or form without being compassionate. Death is not a failure of medicine, it is inevitable for all of us."

Gifts to treasure

Simple thumbprints and carefully individualised written cards were some of the final gifts of one recent patient in the Inpatient Unit to her whānau.

With the support and guidance of Occupational Therapist Tanya Loveard, the patient pushed her thumb into the clay, and dictated the wording for the cards before writing each one carefully in her own hand. A short time later the lady died in the Inpatient Unit.

"Supporting patients in whatever way we can is what hospice is about", says Tanya. " In this situation making small gifts to treasure had great meaning for this patient and her whānau."





Our Christmas wish list

Can you please help us this Christmas? There are some more expensive items we need, and if you could help we'd be so grateful.

- **Refrigerator for the Family Lounge** \$2,600 to replace our 15-year-old clunky fridge
- Bariatric Stroller \$639: to loan to patients in Kāpiti. The Strollers give patients independence by enabling them to get out into the community.
- Cordless sensor mat and monitor three at \$839 each: for patients at home at risk of falls.
- Viking Monarch Power Lift Chair \$798: to replace an old chair currently in use.
- Alenti Bath Chair \$1,250: we have already secured \$15,000 for a Bath Chair for the Inpatient Unit, and need just a little more. It allows the Hospice to bathe patients safely and with dignity.
- **Pride Lift Chair** \$1,795: a new motor recliner chair is needed to replace an old one currently in use.
