

Strawberry Festivals help build Te Whare Rānui

Community fundraising events like the Strawberry Festivals are helping to provide the money to build the Hospice's newest hub, Te Whare Rānui.

Porirua City Council has recently given a green light to the next phase of construction for the building. Director of Development and Infrastructure Diana Pryde said approval for the build was a big moment for the Hospice.

"It means we can now get on and continue building which is very exciting."

It is expected construction work will be completed by April/May 2021.

The development of the community hub will enable the Hospice to better meet the growing and diverse needs of people in the north Wellington area facing a life-limiting illness.

There will be no Inpatient Unit at Te Whare Rānui, with the Newtown base continuing to meet the very specific needs of patients needing care away from home. Once completed, it will give us a really good space to bring patients and their whānau together," Diana said.

"It will also allow us to host community meetings, conduct training for staff and volunteers and have a space for services like counselling."

A smaller section of Te Whare Rānui was completed last year, and is currently being enjoyed by staff.

Director of Fundraising, Marketing and Communications Philippa Sellens said many people had helped to raise the funds needed to get the project off the ground.

"The Hospice has been fundraising for this renovation project for over a year, and we were so pleased to reach our target of \$1 million.

While the generous donations had allowed the build to take place, the Hospice is still in the process of raising funds, and the Strawberry Festivals will help.

"We still need to fundraise for the fixtures and fittings inside, and to create a beautiful entrance space so all our patients and their whānau who come to visit feel comfortable and welcomed."

Meet Nurse Irese

When Irese Baldock says she works at Mary Potter Hospice, people often react with: 'Oh, that must be sad'.

"Sometimes it is, but actually it is more than that," Irese says, "It is extremely rewarding - and also fun."

Irese is a nurse in the Inpatient Unit in Newtown. Originally from the Philippines, Irese moved to New Zealand to further her nursing career. She was drawn to palliative care, so decided to find work in the Hospice sector.

"I was told about Mary Potter Hospice and instantly wanted to get a job there. I knew it was based in Wellington and looked after a large area. I applied for a role and luckily got it."

"It is the most rewarding job. You are not just looking after the physical needs of the patient; you are looking after the whole patient. That includes their emotional and spiritual needs.

"You are also establishing a relationship and rapport, not just with the patient, but also their family. It is very special".

Being able to spend time with patients was hugely important, and something Mary Potter Hospice prioritises. That allows Irese - and other Hospice nurses - to go the extra mile for patients and their families.

On one memorable occasion, Irese was able to support a young mother who was passing away. With Ireses's help, the mother was able to bond with her young son before she died.



"As a Mum of young kids, I knew what I would want in that situation. I tried to help the family so that everyone was able to be supported in their own, individual way."

"It was a tough time, but also extremely beautiful. That is what I love about working with our patients and their families."

The multidisciplinary team which wraps care around a patient and their whānau made the work even more enjoyable, Irese says.

"You are all working together to help the patient. You can meet their needs in a range of ways whether that is a counsellor, a physiotherapist or a doctor. Everyone is focused on supporting the patient, which is pretty amazing."

While the work is sometimes sad, Irese says each day working at Mary Potter Hospice is a privilege.

"You get to look after and spend time with amazing people. I am very lucky to have my job."

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Mary Potter Apartments under construction

The Mary Potter Apartments are on track to be rented out and earning income for the Hospice by mid 2021.

The apartments are directly behind the Hospice in Newtown. Rental income from the apartments will help close the large funding gap between what Government pays for our service and the actual cost of providing it. Each year around \$7 million needs to be raised from the generous Wellington, Porirua and Kāpiti communities.

In October a Mauri Stone was buried on the site by Te Rūnanganui o Te Ātiawa Chair and member of Te Pou Tautoko, Kura Moeahu. The Mauri Stone is a mark of respect for the land and bestows a blessing on the site and the buildings being constructed.

We are grateful to a generous donor who will match donations up to \$500,000. This will help ensure the bank loan to build the apartments is as low as possible. - Lone Worker Device a GPS tracking device to keep our community and Hospice @ Home staff safe when they visit patients at all hours, \$395
- Handheld fans we need a stock of small fans for people who experience breathlessness. We know fans help to increase airflow around patients and reduce the feeling of breathlessness, \$1,260 for 250 fans
- Aroma diffuser to keep patient areas smelling fresh, 2 at \$150 each
- Community back packs robust bags for nurses and doctors to carry equipment they need when visiting patients at home, 3 needed at \$350 each
- Digital voice recorders for patients to record their life story and our team of volunteer biographers to transcribe, 2 needed at \$130 each
- Clinical trolley to hold medical and personal care equipment, \$800
- Saturation monitor/probe helps us find out if patients are getting the oxygen they need. We need 2 at \$156 each
- Roho cushion it's like sitting on air for patients with skin or soft tissue issues, \$1,075
