

A legacy of love and commitment

Rima's extended family catch up every month to connect, share food and pass down stories.

There was nothing Rima wouldn't do for family and friends. And in return, they were there for him too when he needed them - including building a ramp to get outside and running a 24/7 care roster.

Each month Rima's family meet over lunch to connect, share food and pass down stories.

It's a big and growing family – Rima's siblings, wife, children, and 10 grandchildren and great-grandchildren. All connected with a genuine family love and respect.

"Dad was very kind and understanding," say his five children Leanne, Mele, Michelle, Mareta, and Moko. "Dad was very much a family man not only for us but for his siblings, extended family and his friends. He would give the shirt off his back, money in his wallet, car to use and the list goes on."

Married for 55 years, Rima and Shirley met at the Adam's Bruce Chocolate Factory in College Street. He had not long arrived from Rarotonga.

Rima would tell the story of living in Rarotonga in a two-room house with a verandah, and a shed out the back for cooking. He was one of 15 siblings. Transport was a horse and cart.

Rima was never idle. He was a talented sewer, making

wedding dresses for his daughters, his own suits, bridemaids' dresses, and school shirts. When they went to 'Island dos' the girls always had new dresses.

"Dad had a good life. It has come with its ups and downs but there is nothing Dad wouldn't have changed. All of us are Dad's legacy. The traditions, customs, memories, the stories will be with us always for us to pass down."

Rima spent his last three weeks at Mary Potter Hospice, after an all-family meeting with the Hospice agreed it was the best place for him.

"When we got to Mary Potter they were waiting for us. Rima was shown to his room and he said, 'this feels like home.'

"The staff were brilliant – every single one of them. You could ask them any questions about what we should expect and they would explain. They gave you peace of mind.

"The Hospice made the process easier for us. We were tired, but we didn't have to worry about looking after ourselves – the Hospice took care of that too. Our family is forever grateful - we thank you Mary Potter Hospice for your kindness and compassion."

Mary Potter Hospice is working as part of a health system that is under a huge amount of pressure. We know that impacts on the quality of the care people dealing with serious illnesses are getting, as health resources in hospitals and the community are in desperately short supply.

At Mary Potter we know that when we are looking after a patient and their family, their use of ambulance services, emergency department and hospital stays reduces. That's helpful for all users of the system and for us taxpayers who are funding it.

So, in addition to ensuring we can be there for people at the end of their lives, alongside them and their whānau with all the tough and unwelcome things that come with that journey, you are helping us take some of the pressure off the wider health system.

We've been highlighting that with government and as demand for palliative care grows, we will continue to look to the Crown to help supplement your very generous support of Mary Potter Hospice.

As I spend time with our volunteers and people who donate I am struck again by all you are making possible. This is the power of humanity and strong communities in action. I hope you understand just how essential your support is. We could not be there during the last days, without you with us every day!

Shifting focus to second-hand

Mike and Lance are helping our hospice shops raise money in an innovative new way. Based out of our Newlands Hospice Shop, they power our Trade Me online store, where we have around 400 items for sale at any given time. We focus on anything collectable, unique, or high-value. It also allows us to reach the entire country, and you'd be surprised what sells well!

"Digital cameras are in huge demand right now – particularly among 20–30 year olds," Lance explains. "I think this is because younger people are sick of just 'clicking away' on their phones." So when cameras are donated to us, Lance cleans them, sources new batteries and a charger if needed, and tests them. It's also OK if items aren't working, as the team has lots of tricks to get them going again. We can then sell them for \$150-300!

In recent times, with the cost of living, we've noticed that lots of people have shifted their focus to second-hand, and buying items or gifts from the hospice has a feel-good factor.

"I also think the appeal of collectables is that people are buying nostalgia," Mike said. "That could mean buying an item that someone couldn't afford before, or even something that they have lost along the way. And I suppose that loss is a bit like how we lose loved ones in life, too, often after having an experience at hospice."


