When Pete found out his lungs were failing, everything changed. "I used to climb mountains," he says. "Now I get breathless just walking to the kitchen."

For someone who spent his life outdoors climbing, caving, and rescuing others, being stuck inside was tough. "My mates love it," he laughs. "I used to be a high-altitude climber. The higher I went, the easier I breathed. Now I can't even breathe, so they give me heaps of stick about it."

Pete didn't have to face this new chapter alone, thanks to your kindness.

"When I got sick, I ended up in hospital," he says. "Then Mary Potter came in and made everything easier. From mobility support and counselling to transport and companionship, they sorted everything, including a volunteer who now visits me three times a week."

"His name's Bernardo," Pete says. "He's from Colombia. We play board games, have a chat about life, and he even brought a Colombian board game that's about 500 years old."

Pete can't drive anymore and sometimes blacks out when his oxygen drops, so having company means safety and connection. "It's good company," he says.

Every week, Pete also joins the Hospice day programme. "It's awesome," he says. "I get out, meet people. Everyone's got a story." Lately, he's been helping make Christmas decorations. "It's good to have something to do. Doesn't matter if it's not perfect. It's having a go that counts."

Pete's illness doesn't define him. He's someone who's spent a lifetime moving, creating, and supporting others. And with Hospice beside him, those parts of himself haven't vanished. They've simply taken a different shape. Through the day programme and the people around him, Pete's been able to stay active in ways that feel meaningful. He makes things with his hands, connects with people who understand his journey, and finds moments of independence he thought he'd lost.

These aren't separate services. Together they form one circle of care built around the whole person. This care adapts to what matters most to Pete.

If you attended Paraparaumu College over the past 37 years, chances are you remember Mr Merrick Stein. You might have heard his music spilling into hallways.

In his classes, Merrick taught more than music. He instilled confidence when you doubted yourself, discipline when you needed direction, and courage when life felt heavy.

When he died in August, there was uncertainty whether an annual charity concert for Mary Potter Hospice would go ahead. Fellow teacher Natalie said, "The students were so keen to showcase what they had been working on. It mattered to them to put Merrick's work on stage."

So, in October, students, colleagues, and the community came together in a concert of love to honour him. They raised funds for Mary Potter Hospice and carried on his belief in giving back through music.

Merrick's wife of 47 years, Sue, and their family attended the concert, proud to see his legacy honoured in such a heartfelt way.

Sue reflected, "In the early days, Merrick wanted to establish an orchestra where students could showcase their ability and hard work. Then he saw that there were kids at school who had lost a mum or dad or other family, and that's why he always wanted to support the Hospice. Of course, we never knew he would go down that road."

"I'm grateful for what the Hospice gives, and it's up to us to give back to the Hospice. They are dealing with grief all the time and they do it really well."

Sue explained their shared faith was always part of Merrick's music too. "He would say, Thank you God for the gift of music."

That same faith and his music now ripple through every family cared for by Mary Potter Hospice.

Wishes you can grant this Christmas



- \$18 per month pays for a Netflix subscription for use in the Inpatient Unit
- \$30 per month buys a Spotify premium family account for the Inpatient Unit patient iPads
- \$44 for a handheld portable misting fan to help relieve patient breathlessness
- \$50 funds a supermarket voucher for patients facing hard
- \$75 for craft supplies that would help 5 children express their grief

- \$116 funds a large pack of specialty Posca craft pens for day unit art classes
- \$200 pays for books on bereavement care to use for children and parents
- \$450 covers the cost of a nurse's car for a month
- \$635 covers the cost of patient laundry for the IPU for a week
- \$984 allows a community nurse to have a **new mobile phone** to contact patients
- \$1,154 covers the costs of patient **medical supplies** for a week in the Inpatient Unit
- \$2,000 buys equipment for our PA system - a new speaker, mic stand and cables

- \$2,500 buys one month of medical supplies for the Hospice @ Home team - items such as syringes, IV lines, saline, gloves, and sanitizer - and much more.
- \$3,222 buys a Syringe Driver to safely and comfortably deliver pain medication for a patient living at home
- \$3,829 provides a Mangar Swift Inflatable Transfer Slide to transfer and reposition patients safelv
- \$5,680 buys a professional blanket warmer drawer to comfort Inpatient Unit patients
